









The woman stared Eleanor and her companion, who were both wearing knickerbockers, and announced that she wouldn't think of taking in women who were dressed like men. Disappointed, Eleanor then asked her where the next ranch house was. "It won't do you any good," the woman answered, "because I'm on a party line and I'm going to phone everyone on it about some women dressed in trousers." Eleanor and the girl slept in a haystack and went home the next day.



No services are scheduled. Evergreen Funeral. Home, Fountain and Union boulevards, is handling arrangements.


Mrs. Ehrman was born Sept. 27, 1885, in Greenfield, Mass., to George T. and Ellen (Keith) Davis.

She had lived in Colorado Springs since 1911 and was a member of All Souls Unitarian Church, Colorado Mountain Club, American Alpine Club, Fourteeners and was the first woman to climb Grand Teton mountain in Wyoming.

She was a graduate of Wellesly College.

Mrs. Ehrman was married in 1930 in Colorado -Springs to George Edgar Ehrman, who is deceased.

She is survived by a stepson, Kent of Oceanside, Calif.; a nephew, Charles Wilkin Johnstone of Houston; a niece, Ellen Sprague of Lindsay, Calif.; and a great-nephew, Jay Sprague of Colorado Springs.













